You are going to read about four schools that are a little different from what you might expect. For each of the questions below, choose from the schools A - D.

A – Sir Isaac Newton Sixth Form, United Kingdom

Sir Isaac Newton Sixth Form is an unusual school in that it's housed in a former fire station, a listed building that conservation laws demand must remain unaltered. The original features include a coved ceiling, window pelmets, timber flooring as well as fireman's poles at each end of the building. It seems somehow a fitting environment for the UK's first dedicated Maths and Science Sixth Form school – one determined to foster a culture in which those wishing to become scientists are not derided as "geeks". The school has links with a local research park and various other scientific education providers in order to keep pupils and teachers up-to-date with relevant scientific developments.

B – Brooklyn Free School, USA

The school operates under a "noncoercive" philosophy where students are encouraged to develop their own interests and where all learning is self-directed. As such, Brooklyn Free School has no grades, no tests, and no compulsory classes. Students are allowed to stay away from school altogether if they wish. According to a local teacher, the sole aim of the school is to allow children to be themselves and to cultivate their individual strengths. As of spring 2014, the school had 24 graduates, although there are still many people who strongly disapprove of this school's practices.

C – Gulu Village Primary School, China

If you moan about having to cram on to a packed bus each day to go to school, it is probably nothing compared to the journey children have to make to get to Gulu Village Primary School. Gulu is a little-known, isolated village in mountainous Hanyuan County, China. The only way to get to the village is through the Luoma Way, which is filled with zigzag turns, narrow passages between rock walls, and rickety bridges. The school has been around since the late '80s and has only one teacher, Shen Qijun, who came to Gulu Village when he was 18 years old. Back then, the school was in a bad state of repair and didn't even have plumbing. Shen rallied the villagers after a student sprained his ankle while trying to get to a toilet elsewhere on the mountain, and they collectively renovated the school – and added a toilet!

D – Deep Springs College, USA

You roll out of bed at 8:30 a.m. to the sound of your piercing alarm and dash to the academic side of campus just in time for your 9 a.m. lecture. Sound familiar? Well, imagine swapping that routine for a before sunrise wake-up call to prepare meals, milk cows or assist them during birth. For the all-male 26-student body at Deep Springs College, located on a cattle-ranch in California, this is what a typical day consists of. A student is assigned a new task every seven weeks for at least twenty hours a week. This includes fixing fences or leaks in irrigation lines, or digging up frozen pipes. Working in the field or milking the cows may sound less daunting though when you consider the fact that each student at Deep Springs College gets a full scholarship.

Amsterdam hotel proud to be the world's worst

The Hans Brinker Hotel, located within walking distance of the red light district and many of the city's museums, is about as comfortable as a minimum security prison.

While another hotel might brag about its comfortable beds, spectacular views and excellent customer service, the Hans Brinker Hotel in Amsterdam promises a lift that doesn't break down, a door that locks and comfort like that of a minimum security prison.

Proclaiming itself as "The Worst Hotel in the World", the Hans Brinker goes so far as to recommend a list of nicer places to stay in the Dutch capital, including the Hotel de L'Europe, Hotel Krasnapolsky and the Intercontinental Hotel – all luxury spots with the finest amenities. In fact, of the hotel's 16 recommendations, the Hans Brinker clocks in at 15, just below an abandoned mine shaft. The only place on the list deemed to be even worse than the Hans Brinker itself is a nearby graveyard.

The amenities are stark; the hostel-style rooms sleep up to eight in cranky metal bunk beds with battered blue metal lockers to store valuables, and the ensuite bathrooms offer little more than simple white tile decor, no free shampoo or soap in sight.

Still, with beds available for only 22.50 to 53.50 euros per person per night, the 127-room hotel near the Keizersgracht tram stop manages to remain fully booked most of the year with students in their early twenties and backpackers looking for no-fuss accommodation.

Those that take the plunge report back with mixed reviews, with the hotel ranking at 59th out of 130 similar lodgings in Amsterdam on the user review site TripAdvisor. "You get what you pay for," said one reviewer. "It wins by its proximity. I was pretty happy we didn't stay at the hotel all the time though." Other reviewers found the hotel's self-description, as outlined above, on point. "The rooms were indeed like prison cells, with rickety old beds and metal lockers that didn't close properly. Walking down the hallways was like walking through an abandoned old hospital... this is quite simply the worst hotel on Earth."

As the Hans Brinker suggests (at number 11 on its list), a sleeping bag on the side of the motorway might be a better option.



High frequency sounds in modern life may make people sick

Libraries, train stations and shopping centres could be unwittingly making people ill by constantly pumping out high frequency noise, a new study has suggested. Researchers found evidence of ultrasound in locations where people have complained of dizziness and fatigue. Ultrasound in public places can be generated from a (39) of sources including loudspeakers, automatic door sensors and spotlights.

For several years, workers who have been regularly (40) to occupational ultrasound from industrial devices for cleaning and drilling have reported similar negative effects, but no causal link has ever been found.
